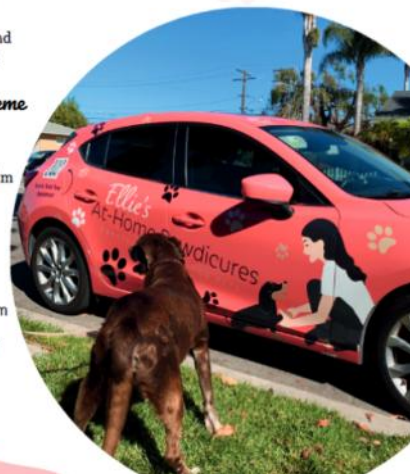

- *Known for its waterproof coat and ability to swim all day, the Portuguese Water Dog has gained popularity in the past decade, moving up the list from #55 to #49 in 2013.
- *A cat's ear has 30 muscles that control the outer ear (by comparison, human ears only have six muscles). These muscles rotate 180 degrees, so the cat can hear in all directions without moving its head.
- *The eyespots of a giant panda cub are initially in the shape of a circle. As the cub grows, the circles become shaped like a teardrop.
- *Horses produce approximately 10 gallons of saliva a day.
- *Besides smelling with their nose, cats can smell with an additional organ called the Jacobson's organ, located in the upper surface of the mouth.

Animal Kingdom Facts

*Octopuses die after giving birth. While human parents sacrifice much for their offspring, few routinely give up their lives. But such is the destiny of a female octopus: tending her eggs is the last thing she'll do.

*Snails have teeth, lots of them - around 14,000 to be precise. The teeth are set in a jaw called a radula.

*Hippos can't swim and instead they sink in water and run along the river bottom. However, as mammals, hippos have lungs just like we do, and therefore can't breathe underwater - they can only last about five minutes between breaths.

*The hairiest animal in the world is the sea otter, whose luxurious fur, according to a 2010 study, comprises a phenomenal 100- 160,000 hairs per square centimetre (an adult probably sports more than a billion hairs in total).

*The best sniffer of the animal kingdom is a mole - a weird mole. The freakish, tentacled snout of the star-nosed mole *Condylura cristata* may look funny - and earn it a place on our weirdest animals list - but it's nothing to laugh at. It could be the most skilled sniffer under the sun - even when underwater.

*There are animals that can live forever - well, sort -of. Immortal jellyfish, along with at least five other jellyfish species, dodge death by hitting rewind. Even after a dead medusa has collapsed into a pile of mush, its cells can grow into polyps. It's like a fragment of butterfly wing turning into a caterpillar. Immortal jellyfish can still die, from predation and disease, but their regenerating abilities make them tough and successful.

Longest Dog Ears on a Living Dog

According to the Guinness World Records, the longest ears on a living dog are 68 cm (26.77 in), with both the left and right ears measuring 34 cm (13.38), and was achieved by Lou, a black and tan Coonhound and his owner Paige Olsen (both USA) in Milwaukie, Oregon, USA, as verified on 30 July 2020.

Bird Facts

*Birds don't pee. Birds are creatures of the air and therefore need to stay as light as possible. So, instead of excreting waste matter as both urine and faeces, birds (with the exception of the ostrich) ditch their waste in one go through an opening called the cloaca. They don't have bladders, nor urethral openings.

*The world's loudest bird, the male white bellbird, produces an ear-splitting sound that is something like the two-tone horn of a fast train approaching a station.

*It typically takes 20-60 minutes for birds to lay an egg, though there are exceptions. Geese and turkeys take significantly longer, while many nest parasites are able to lay incredibly quickly. Cuckoos for example average just 10 seconds.

Did you know . . . !

The oldest archaeological evidence of the domestication of the cat dates back 9,500 years. The bones of a cat were discovered in the Neolithic village of Shillourokambos on the island of Cyprus. The position of the cat in the ground was next to the bones of a human, whose similar state of preservation strongly suggests they were buried together. The discovery was made by French scientists, led by Professor Jean Guilaine of the CNRS Centre d'Anthropologie in Toulouse, France, and announced in the journal Science in April 2004.

Did you know . . . !

*Emerging 60 million years ago, the first horse was called Eohippus (The Dawn Horse) and was tiny, weighing only 12 pounds and standing just 14 inches high. In contrast to the modern one-toed horse, the Eohippus had four toes on its front feet and three on its hind feet.

As of late 2025, the global giant panda population is around 2,700, with about 1,900 in the wild (mostly in China's new national park system) and over 800 in captivity, a significant increase from past decades due to intensive conservation efforts, habitat protection, and breeding programs, though threats like habitat loss still persists. China's captive population alone grew to 808 by November 2025, a near doubling in ten years, while the wild population is stable or growing thanks to improved management.

Don't Mess With the Nest

1



Tree trimming season is over!

In California, some species begin nesting as early as January. Trim trees and shrubs between November and January. If you must trim outside that time, find a wildlife trained arborist at: www.treecareforbirds.com

2



Nests are protected by law.

Both the federal Migratory Bird Act and state laws in California protect native birds, their eggs and their nests. If you believe nests are being harassed or removed, call state officials via the CalTIP line: (888) 334-2258

3



Keep away from nest sites.

Excessive presence of humans or pets around the nest may cause birds to abandon their eggs. You can also draw wild predators to the nest this way. Keep your distance and keep pets indoors or on leash around nests.

4



Not all babies need help.

Baby birds grow rapidly and their parents' care for them will change suddenly. A parent you haven't seen may be hanging around. A baby bird on the ground may just be learning to fly. When in doubt, ask a professional.

5



Know your nearest rehabilitator.

In the LA area you can call California Wildlife Center at (310) 458-9453 for help with wildlife. Most baby birds do not eat at night: if you find a baby bird overnight, place them in a warm, quiet place away from people and pets until the morning.

So you see a fallen baby...



Injuries

Are there obvious wounds, visible blood, or has the animal been touched by a dog or cat?

If the answer is yes, the animal needs help. Baby skin is very thin and does not easily show bite marks.

Feathers

Is the animal feathered/furred, or naked in some places? Are feathers/fur fluffy or smooth?

Keeping track of this information or, even better, taking a picture can help a rehabilitator direct you.

Mobility

Can the baby stand and hop?

Many baby birds go through a stage of life where they jump from the nest and spend time on the ground. If they can stand, move around, and cry they may be completely healthy and normal.

Nest

Can you see the nest?

Fallen baby birds can sometimes be returned to their nest. If you can see the nest and the baby is alert, take a picture then return the baby to the nest. Contact a rehabilitator for further assessment of the baby and monitor the nest from a distance.

Next Steps

What if the baby needs help?

If the baby cannot return to the nest, keep in a small cardboard box in a warm, quiet place away from people and pets. Do not feed as the wrong food at the wrong time can be deadly. In the LA area, you can call (310) 458-9453 for assistance from California Wildlife Center.

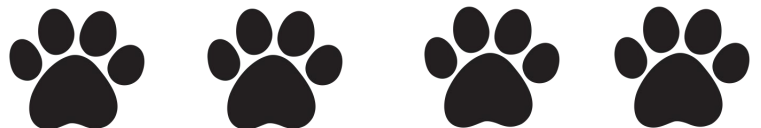

ORIGINS OF THE WORD "DOG"

For many of us, dog is one of the most wonderful words in the English language! But – what does it mean, and where does it come from? After all, most words in the modern language are derivatives of much older words.

“Dog” is one of the terms that have unclear origins. For a long time during the 14th - 15th centuries, our canine friends were called simply “hounds”, while the word “dog” was used to refer to a specific type of hound, a large group including the mastiff. By the 16th century the word dog had become accepted as a generic term.

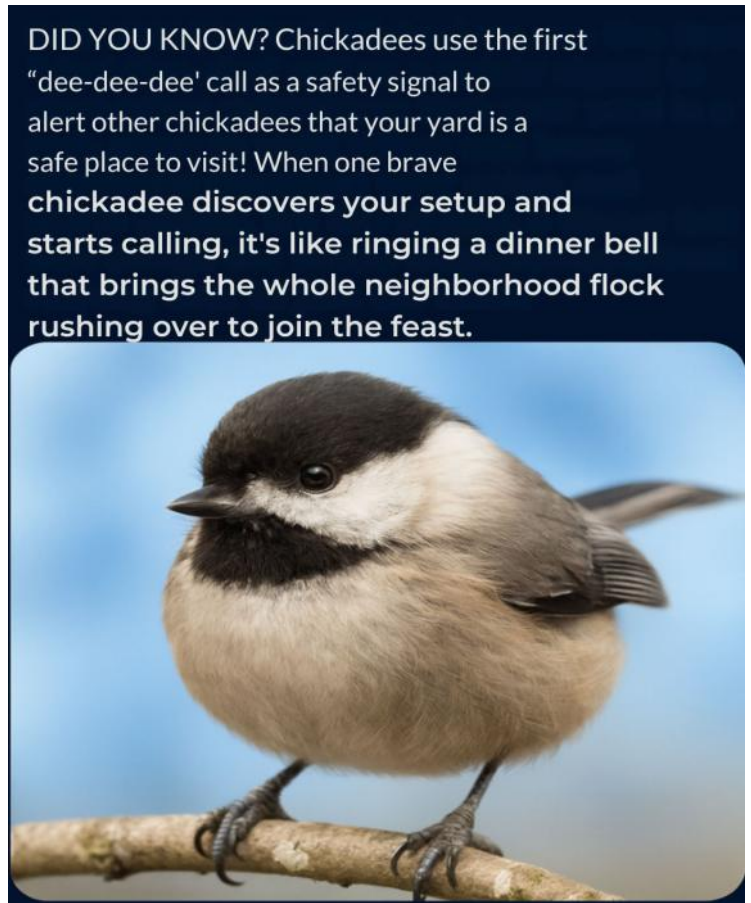
But where did it come from? Perhaps from the Old Germanic language, which has spawned so many modern English words? However, in Germany the general term for dog is “hund”, and “hound” is a cognate of this word.

Etymology shows the relationship between Old English hund, Old High German hund, Old Norse hund and Gothic hunds. Canis is a generic term meaning "dog" is Latin. The term "canine" comes from the adjective form, caninus ("of the dog"). In many other languages, the word for “dog” is based on the old root “kutt”, which was common in older Indo-European languages.

Today, the term “dog” means our furry four legged friends that are loveable, cute and more often treated as a member of our family.

So what’s in a name by any other definition!

Butterflies taste with their feet as their taste sensors are located there. They can taste it by just standing on their food. They don't have mouths that allow them to bite or chew, instead they have a long straw-like structure called a proboscis which they use to drink nectar and juices.

*Each cat has its own fingerprint, which is like an identity card for them. These impressions are formed by unique lines and patterns on the pads of the front and hind legs. Even between siblings, no two prints are the same.

Tortoises are part of the Testudinidae family and are among the oldest living animal groups on Earth, having been around for over 230 million years. HORSE FACTS

***Stabling and other forms of isolation** – Putting horses in stables might seem benign, and many horses will also voluntarily enter stables due to the association with it being where they are fed. But stabling prevents horses from engaging in most of their grazing and social behaviours. Horses rarely voluntarily isolate themselves from other horses, and prolonged social isolation can lead to behavioural problems such as separation distress, rug-chewing and stereotyped behaviours such as weaving and stall-walking.

***Horses can suffer from depression.** Some of the known reasons for horses to suffer from depression is isolation from conspecifics, lack of movement, boredom and excessive and violent training.

***Patting them** – Many horse people routinely pat their horses as a reward for a job well done. But horses have not evolved to find this rewarding. They don't pat each other – instead, they scratch or gently nibble each other as a form of bonding. A recent study showed patting increased horses' heart rates, whereas scratching lowered them and was associated with behavioural signs of relaxation and enjoyment.

***Horses graze up to 17 hours a day!** – horses are grazing animals and spend most of their time searching for food – due to their physiology they have to take in food constantly in small amounts, thus it is vital that horses are given ad libitum roughage (such as hay) or possibility to graze so that they do not develop any painful gastrointestinal dysfunction like gastritis or colics!

***Horses can consume approx. 5 l / 100 kg of body weight of water a day** – not only feed is important but also sufficient water intake. A 500 kg horse for example would drink around 25 l a day. This of course also depends on various factors like outside temperature, humidity, age and how the horse is worked.

***There are fewer bones in a horse than in humans.** It's only one bone less, but in total, there are 205 bones in the skeleton of a horse.

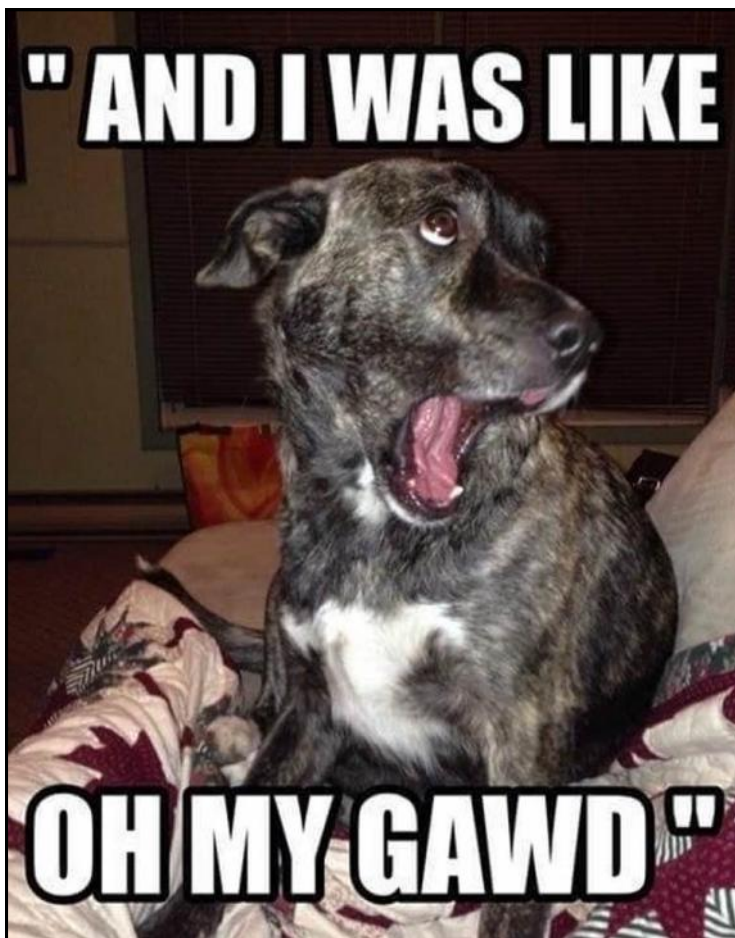
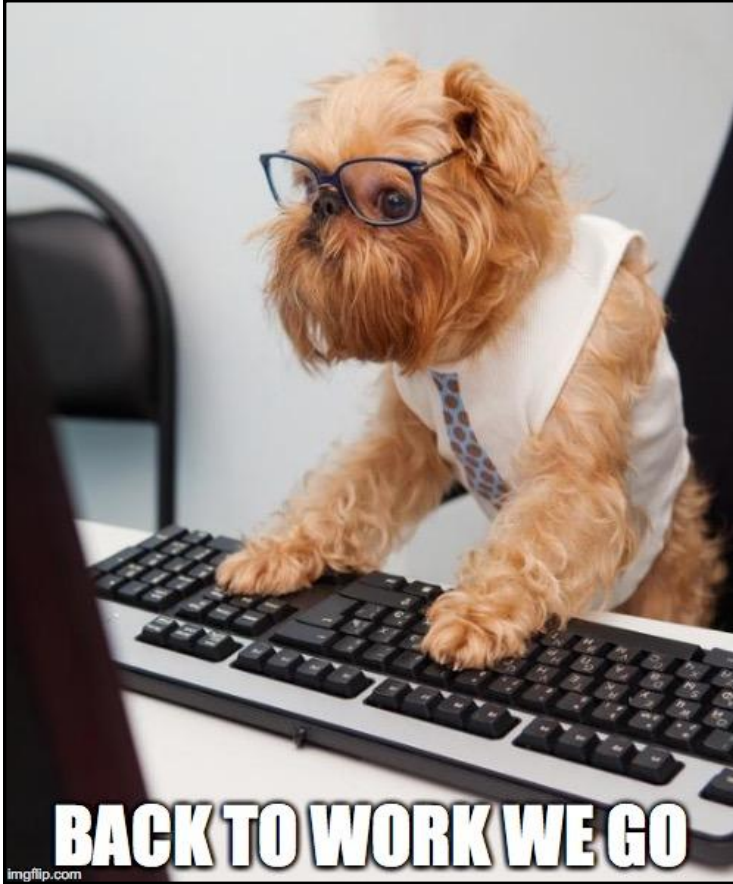
